I'm writing in order to "communicate" with you this month. First, I want to "communicate" a reminder about one of my favorite services. It's the Passover Morning Service that takes place on the first morning of Pesach. We always get a good turnout, but I'm also always concerned to be sure the current year is as successful as the previous year. Can you mark your calendar, then? The Seder is Saturday night, April 19 and the community service is Sunday, April 20 at 10:30 a.m.

If you're celebrating a five year anniversary, let me also "communicate" with you. Our Caring Community is planning to honor you on Friday, April 11 at the 6 p.m. Kabbalat Shabbat service. This is for real! If you are celebrating a 15th or 20th anniversary or any anniversary that is a multiple of five, we would like to share that happiness with you. We would like to do so because we envision Sinai at its best as a community, and your anniversary is certainly something for us to honor and highlight. Don't be shy. You should have received an invitation in the mail and we truly do want to see you on April 11.

There is one other "communication" I'd like to share with you; it relates very significantly to marriage and weddings. Back in December of 2006, I announced that I was adopting a new position on mixed marriages. Although I had previously not officiated at wedding ceremonies between a Jew and a non-Jew, I announced that I was going to begin officiating at some mixed ceremonies. I wrote a fairly long description of my proposal and received some very positive feedback. Since then I have officiated at one such ceremony and two others are on my calendar.

Here's the reason I'm writing again: I think not everyone at Sinai has picked up on this change in my policy. Conversations with some congregants have led me to believe that one "communication" on this matter wasn't sufficient. So, here is a second "communication." As we build our Jewish future and prepare for Passover, please read (or reread) my comments on mixed marriage. You'll find them on our website. Follow the link under rabbi.

Message from Dave Roberts, President of Sinai Temple

Dear Friends,

As I write this article at the beginning of March, the search for our new Cantor is not complete. I do, however, want to give you an update on the process and our progress.

First, I want to tell you that we are very fortunate to have dedicated and capable committee members who are willing to commit long hours to this important effort. They have been chosen because they represent the demographics of the congregation and they have tried to keep an open ear to congregation's comments. Led ably by Mel Chafetz, the committee has been meeting practically every week since the middle of January.

Initially, the committee completed an application describing the many positive attributes of Sinai Temple and our needs. This application was then posted on the American Conference of Cantors (ACC) website for potential candidates to see. This extensive document is very detailed and took considerable time to compile. I am very pleased to report that the feedback from the ACC indicates that our application is one of the strongest reviewed by potential candidates. We have also received very positive feedback about our website and the nature of our congregational community.

During January, the committee held two meetings open to the congregation to solicit further input from our members. With that additional information and the updated Cantor's job description, we then identified what specific attributes we would be looking for in our new Cantor.

Currently, we are reviewing applications and conducting phone interviews with candidates. After interviewing several candidates and listening to their CD's, we will invite a few candidates for vocal auditions and in-person interviews with the committee. When appropriate, some members of the Search Committee will visit the applicant's congregation to observe them in their home pulpit.

Regrettably, the ACC rules do not allow prospective Cantors to audition for the entire congregation. Accordingly, it is our intention to select one or two finalists to present to the Board of Directors for approval to hire. Hopefully, this process will be completed later this spring. Assuming that we do find the right candidate, we expect the new Cantor to be in place by September.

The Search Committee and the Board of Directors are committed to hiring only the right person; someone we feel fully meets the needs of our congregation—we will not hire just to fill the position. If an acceptable candidate is not found at this time, we will hire interim staff to lead music at our services and prepare our Bar/Bat Mitzvah students. In that event, we would repeat the search process at the beginning of 2009 when the ACC hiring season again opens. Due to certain ACC restrictions pertaining to confidentiality, the Search Committee members may not be able to answer your questions in more detail. For this reason, I hope to continue to update you in more formal ways through this newsletter and by other means.

The 2008 Community Yom HaShoah Commemoration will commemorate Israel's 60th Anniversary with a traditional memorial service and program for those who died during the Holocaust and also remember the Birth of the State of Israel in 1948, which served as the permanent home for so many of the survivors of the Shoah.

Special recognition will be given to the Honorable Sidney M. Cooley, who served as military commander of a Displaced Persons' Camp in Bayreuth, Germany. Judge Cooley rehabilitated and trained over 300 Holocaust survivors who were resettled in Israel.

B'nai Tzedek Celebrates Ten Years With Tzedakah Fair – Tuesday, May 20

On May 20, young people from the Pioneer Valley will celebrate their commitment to philanthropy at the annual B'nai Tzedek banquet, to be held at Sinai Temple.

Members of B'nai Tzedek, including teens and young people in college and beyond, have been invited to the party, which is hosted each year by the Harold Grinspoon Foundation. "This is a fun group. I met great friends and I learned a lot!"

"It's the most fun activity that the temple does."

I am happy to be a part of what I feel is an important program for young girls. Facing the challenges of adolescence can be difficult, and groups like Rosh Hodesh: It's a Girl Thing can provide support and education to help girls navigate through their teenage years.

March was a busy month as we initiated a new program, (baby sitting at services), continued our twice monthly meetings and had a great time at the Purim Schpiel.


I am excited for April as we will be able to do more outside. We will continue our meetings along with honoring our rich tradition of Passover.
