People are both anxious and optimistic these days. The optimism for most has to do with the excitement about Barack Obama. The president elect represents the possibility of change in remarkable ways. And yet so many of us are anxious. We worry about the economy, about jobs, prices, real estate values, and retirement funds. The future is much less secure than we expected.

And no one really has answers or sure solutions. At best, there are responses. If we can't fix all that is broken, we can at least reconsider our own needs and priorities. We can walk a bit more slowly. Sadly humbled by tough circumstances, we can perhaps turn to some first principles. Think more about what really matters. Do more of those things that really matter to us as human beings.

I suspect there may be no better time than now to belong to a synagogue and to join our Temple community as we try something very simple: Rediscover Shabbat.

Remember my message on Yom Kippur morning? I imagined so many of us sitting in front of a computer screen for hours every day, bodies scrunched up, shoulders hunched over, eyes locked on the screen. You can learn a lot roaming the Internet. You can read more than you ever wanted on our economic woes. But you can't have a life at the computer. You can't breathe when you're wound tight as a drum.

That is why I believe it really is time to take back your time. For the sake of your sanity, humanity, and your health, you need to stand up and stretch.

Or in other words, relax, renew yourself, recharge your batteries. That's what Shabbat is about. That's what Sinai offers too.

As Chanukah approaches, take time to breathe. Revisit our website for ideas on Shabbat. I wish you Happy Chanukah, but more than that I invite you into Shabbat. It's the perfect antidote for these times of anxiety, and it's just around the corner every seven days.

Chanukah Questions and Answers

When is Chanukah?

Chanukah begins Sunday, December 21. The last candle is lit Sunday, December 28.

How do we observe Chanukah today?

Chanukah is almost entirely a time for celebration, although it can be more than that. This year, for example, how about implementing the new "tradition" of Ner Shel Tzedakah, which means dedicating one "ner/candle/night" to tzedakah. Make Tuesday, December 23 different by giving gifts of tzedakah.

How do we prepare the candles when Chanukah arrives?

Place the candles in the chanukiah (Chanukah menorah) from right to left.

How many candles are used?

On the first night of Chanukah one light is kindled. On the following night, two lights and so on until on the eighth night, eight lights are kindled. This does not, of course, include the shammas which is the candle used every night to light the other candles of the day.

Where does the chanukiah go?

If possible the chanukiah should go near or at a window. In this way passersby can see the burning candles, which means according to Jewish tradition, that we have helped in the process of Pirusum Ha-nais—the Publicizing of the Chanukah Miracle and Story.

How do we light the candles?

Just after nightfall, say the blessings. The first two are said every night. The third is only said on the first night. After the blessings light the candles by going from left to right so that the additional light of each night is kindled first.

Do we do anything different on Shabbat (Friday evening, December 26)?

Yes. On that night we light the chanukiah first and after that Shabbat candles. For a really good time, don't do your candles at home. Bring yourself and your candles to Temple for a service, good food, and fun.

Paper and Plastic Bags Contribute to Global Warming

Paper bags have the highest global warming impact per bag compared to other types of bags. 70% more global warming gasses are emitted making a paper bag than a plastic bag, and 50 times more water pollution. In 1999, Americans used 10 billion paper shopping bags, consuming 14 million trees.

Plastic bags are made from petroleum that could be used in other ways. The 300 billion plastic bags that American throw away each year are made from millions of barrels of petroleum.

How about reusable bags?

Reusable bags reduce all these costs by a factor of hundreds. So...before you “bag” it this Chanukah, please THINK GREEN.

Chanukah Tzedakah: Ner Shel Tzedakah, Tuesday, December 23

The latkes are wonderful. The candles look beautiful. Chanukah is a joyous time of the year for us Jews. THIS YEAR our Social Action Committee suggests something NEW. On the THIRD night of Chanukah, December 23, we encourage families to donate the value of the gifts they would ordinarily exchange (or the gifts themselves) to local or national organizations assisting the poor. Let this be an evening for NER SHEL TZEDAKAH - THE LIGHT OF TZEDAKAH

Chanukah Service: Friday, December 26 at 8 p.m.

It's the sixth night of Chanukah. Bring your chanukiah (menorah) and candles. There will be a service with candle lighting for everyone. Songs. Latkes. And games for Chanukah.

Message from Sheila Shear Director of Education

Shalom Chaverim,

So, what is it like to be learning at Sinai Temple during the 5769 school year? On a usual Sunday morning with no extra special programming here are some of the options. If you are in kindergarten, first, or second grade, you attend for several hours on Sunday morning and learn beginning Hebrew, about the Synagogue, about Holidays, about Israel and what it means to be part of a Jewish family. You also get to learn through stories and art and music. If you are in third, fourth, fifth or sixth grade you come to learn for several hours on Sunday and 90 minutes during the week. On Sunday you get to work on Hebrew skills, and you also might learn about history, the prophets, life cycle, tikun olam, and Torah. During the final hour you will have an opportunity to extend your Jewish learning in music with the Cantor, cooking, sports, time for Hebrew mastery, or planning a tzedakah(charity) fair. During each weekday class for 3rd to 6th graders there is time to learn about prayer, individualized Hebrew reading and language instruction, and t'filah(praying). In 7th grade students continue with in depth study of Torah, Pirke Avot, on Tuesday evenings and Ethics and Holocaust studies as well as time to learn about the Israeli National Sports Teams and other Israeli sports on Sunday mornings. But learning for our students does not stop in the 7th grade.

Learning in 8th grade continues beginning with service learning in the SPARK program for 8th graders and mature adults from our own Sinai community, a trimester on our local Jewish community and another trimester on peer relationships and ethical social behavior. In 9th grade we begin the year with some straight talk about sexual ethics from a Reform Jewish perspective, and continue the year with Judaism in politics and social action. During the 9th grade students have an opportunity to travel to the Religious Action Center in Washington D.C. for an in depth experience with the politics of social action. Students in grades 11 and 12 are also invited to join the 9th graders on this trip. Check it out <http://rac.org/confprog/ltaken>. Of course the end to formal educational programming for students at Sinai is the incredible year students spend learning with the Rabbi. Sorry, no info-you have to experience it to be in the know!

So, just in case you were wondering what our kids are doing here this has been your introduction. Want to know more...come by and see us some time.

Future "morning minyan" services will take place on Wednesdays, January 7, February 4, March 4, April 1, May 6, and June 3.

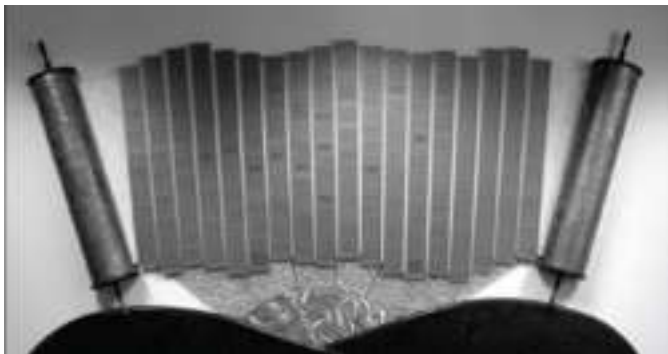
First Thursdays (mostly): Lunch and Learn Thursday, December 4 12:00 - 1:15 p.m.

We had a wonderful Evening with Cantor Levson at the end of October. We had a nice turnout of a cross section of our membership. The cantor led us in a discussion of the place for men in today's Jewish world. It was very interesting and we look forward to working with Cantor Levson.

Special: Can you help me recall some of the men who led our organization in the early days? I have done research with our old bulletins, but could not find the names of our leaders for several of our early years.
