"I'm not sure. Am I Jewish?" That's how one of our High School students entered a conversation about identity last month. In anticipation of Christmas and the prominence of Christian stories and symbols at that time of year, we were talking about the origins of our sister religion. Another student had said, "You're not really born a Christian. You need to be baptized. But with Judaism, you get your identity from birth. You're born a Jew." To which the first student had responded, "How about me? I'm not sure. Am I Jewish?"

I know what this student meant. He has a Jewish father and a mother who isn't Jewish. Somewhere in the mists of time he had heard something about having to have a Jewish mother. So he asked, "Am I Jewish?"

The students and I looked around the table. Of the eight teenagers present, four had two parents who were Jewish. Four had a Jewish father married to a mom who wasn't Jewish.

Traditionally speaking, the answer was clear. A person is a Jew only if he is born of a Jewish mother.

But that's hardly the end of the story and here is what I told the students: It's true. According to the halacha (Judaism's legal background), you are a Jew if you have a Jewish mother (or if you convert to Judaism.) But the Reform movement hasn't closed the book on Jewish practice. Instead, we've maintained that the book needs to be open so that new chapters and understandings can be added.

Bearing that in mind, the Reform movement maintains that as long as a child has one Jewish parent (mom or dad) and as long as that child is raised as a Jew, that child is a Jew.

So were the four children around the table with one Jewish parent Jewish? Most definitely. Yes. For sure.

We can't take Judaism for granted. We can't be fully Jewish unless we live it and learn it and celebrate it. But the blessing of Reform is that we have open doors. We believe Judaism is a precious inheritance, and we want to share it as broadly and graciously as we can.

Yes, you're Jewish if you are raised as a Jew. Yes, you're Jewish if you continue to make it part of your life

And, yes, even if you're not Jewish, you are a part of this community. Together, we are living out a great vision. As the Temple mission statement says,

Sinai Temple is a welcoming and inclusive Reform Congregation where our members pursue a continuing journey of Jewish growth. We are guided by the history and traditions of the Jewish people as we encounter the challenges of the modern world. We encourage

participation in prayer, life-long Jewish learning, and social justice within a joyful, creative, and compassionate community.

Dear Friends – During the month of January, I will be on a modified sabbatical. I will be taking time for study and thought although I will still be devoting time to our fundraising campaign. My best wishes for 2014. See you in February.

At our October Shalom Sunday, families learned about the role of the mezuzah in a Jewish home. Rabbi Shapiro led us on a “Mezuzah Hunt,” to look for mezuzot throughout the synagogue. Each child made his or her own mezuzah from an upcycled glue stick, learned the blessing for hanging it up, and the rituals associated with passing by it. The book “A Mezuzah on the Door” was a fabulous ending for the morning.

The children learned about Chanukah at our November Shalom Sunday. They each made a candle hat and then joined together to sing and dance as a living, “human menorah.” For an open-ended art activity, the children dipped driedels in paint and spun them on large sheets of paper to see what type of design would appear. Our children were also excited to participate in the PJ Library Pajama Drive at the November Shalom Sunday. They brought in new winter pajamas and then walked proudly together to the donation bin. STUFF events always include a simple act of tzedakah (often putting some coins in a tzedakah box or donating food items) to teach our children about this mitzvah.

We welcome all young families to join us for upcoming STUFF programs! Our STUFF coordinators are parents of young children, and they design lively, casual, engaging programs for children 0-5 years old and their families. Come to a STUFF event and see why so many families have become ‘regulars’: children dancing to Jewish songs, families sitting together and listening to stories from the Torah, and craft projects that bring Jewish holidays to life. If you want to introduce your young children to Jewish traditions or continue the traditions you already have in place, this is a wonderful place to start.

Tara has worked in developing grassroots leaders from rural south Louisiana to suburban Chicago, from Pueblo reservations in New Mexico to Hartford, Connecticut.

Most recently, Tara led organizing efforts that resulted in the passage of ground-breaking local and state immigrant rights legislation in Connecticut.

In addition to her organizing work, Tara has successfully pursued other interests which include starting Icing, a cupcake business, founding the Capitol Cinema Collective and directing the Hartford International Film Festival.

This Year's Confirmation Class on a Civil Rights Journey

Over the first weekend of November, this year's Confirmation Class journeyed down south to visit the central sites of the 1960's civil rights movement. The class went to Selma, Montgomery, and Birmingham, Alabama as well as Atlanta. The following reflections from class members summarize some of the trip's incredible highlights.

This journey was very important and enlightening. Seeing how passionate the activists were back then and how emotional they are today made the experience more powerful. I have met the most spiritual people I have ever met on this trip.

The service at Ebenezer Baptist Church was like nothing I had ever experienced and has made me more understanding of how important the idea of God is to some people. I think the message taken from our guide in Selma is that we can finish the puzzle and that "the dream" is still very much alive today. It's due to the fact that she made me realize that I am part of the future fight for civil rights. I had thought the movement was something more of the past. It is still alive.

The trip means to me that people had to give their lives for people to have rights. On the trip, I learned to never give up. During the trip, I also got to stand where Rosa Parks entered the bus, where hoses were sprayed at people, and where Martin Luther King, Jr. met his people before the marches. I was able to walk across the Edmund Pettus Bridge. This is real history and real life.

Before coming on this trip to Georgia and Alabama, learning about the Civil Rights movement meant reading words while watching some videos. But being in the exact spots where the people made history changed my outlook on the events and the people. It made me realize how courageous you had to be to stand up and have an impact for something you wanted and deserved.

Being at the places where the history actually took place enhanced the learning because we were stepping on the footprints of history.
