For Your Consideration

Rabbi Mark Dov Shapiro

Last month a congregant asked me the following question, "I'm Jewish. My spouse is not Jewish. Can we be buried together at Sinai Temple's cemetery?"

It was a very focused question, and I think it's important to share it with you because, in between the lines, I suspect the congregant may have been asking an even bigger question. *"If one of us is Jewish and the other isn't, how do we belong in the Sinai community altogether?"*

I hope most of you reading this message already know the answer to this question. Our congregation is home to all.

It's true that I don't ask non-Jews to recite the Hebrew blessing at the Torah when their child becomes a Bar or Bat Mitzvah, but I think any non-Jewish member of Sinai who has ever participated in his/her child's Bar/Bat Mitzvah knows how significantly and respectfully he or she was involved. Each was invited to join his/her Jewish spouse when the Torah blessing was said and the non-Jewish parent was invited at that very precious moment to share a personal message for the child.

As I said last year during Yom Kippur, we are all in this together. In fact, our community is enriched and strengthened because so many of the non-Jews who belong to Sinai give us their heart and soul. We are grateful.

Beyond that, however, I do think there are questions and issues about forming a Jewish home which arise uniquely where there is a mixed marriage. For that reason, I am very pleased to let you know that our Temple member, Peter Zimmer (a former Vice President of Sinai and a skilled group facilitator) is going to offer a three session discussion group for mixed married couples. The details are described inside this Bulletin. The agenda will be wide open. Peter will be there to listen and help shape a meaningful discussion.

Sinai is open to everyone as we build for the Jewish future. (And, by the way, the answer is YES. Jews and non-Jewish spouses may be buried in our cemetery. It's a natural part of how we understand building a loving community.)

You can't miss it! Every time you enter the Temple, you see the box for THE OPEN PANTRY on the floor outside the Temple office. Sometimes the box is full; sometimes it's fairly empty. But every week the Open Pantry truck comes by to scoop up whatever the box contains and take it back to the Open Pantry.

You can help keep the box full. Whenever you go shopping, buy an extra non-perishable food item. Then whenever you come to the Temple, bring along your food item and drop it in the box. If you're coming to a meeting or services, if you've got business in the office, if your child is coming to Religious School, start a new MITZVAH HABIT. Bring some food along and place it in the box for the OPEN PANTRY.

Mishkan T'filah – As We Consider A New Reform Prayer Book

Although Sinai has not yet made a decision to use the new Reform Prayer Book, many people have wondered about the background to the new siddur. Here are some Q&A's prepared by Jeff Ochs and Robyn Newhouse of our Ritual Committee.

Why change from the familiar Gates of Prayer that was published in the 1970's?

A national survey found that many congregations, including ours, had begun creating their own prayer books which they often used in place of Gates of Prayer. The survey asked what Reform worshippers throughout the United States sought from a new prayer book. They learned that people wanted transliteration, translation, and more gender-neutral language. The rabbis and editors also wanted a prayer book that might help re-engage Jews in meaningful worship. It would offer a balance of creativity and beauty, theology and purpose.

How is Mishkan T'filah organized?

Almost all Hebrew prayers appear alongside a transliteration and are followed by an exact translation – not an interpretation – of the prayer. People wanted this. A lot of those attending services cannot read Hebrew. And many of those who can read the Hebrew words may not understand what all of the words mean.

Mishkan T'filah also addresses questions people may have about the prayers they are reading. At the bottom of the page are historical references, interpretations and explanations of traditional body movements associated with a particular prayer.

For most prayers the Hebrew translation and transliteration appear on the right hand page. On the facing (left hand) page are alternative readings to the translation. The rabbi or prayer leader is able to choose the interpretation or alternative reading that responds to the needs of the community at the time of the service. The alternative readings express varied perceptions of God and perceptions of what God expects from us. Some are poetic or philosophical. Others talk about social justice or the challenges of daily life. They reflect the diversity of the worshippers even within congregations such as ours.

Of course, some prayers such as the Sh'ma and the Torah service don't have alternatives. The Sh'ma is written across two pages as a visual expression of its importance. It even has two letters larger than the others. This is the way it appears in the Torah. This attention to the visual presentation of the service is evident throughout.

Are there changes in the prayers – in Hebrew and translations?

Yes. Some prayers in Mishkan T'filah have different wording than those in Gates of Prayer. The Amidah includes references to our foremothers, Sarah, Rebecca, Rachel and Leah. The V'Ahavta offers a paragraph that was omitted from previous Reform prayer books. Translations provide gender neutral descriptions of God.

Why not just keep using our own custom prayer books?

The CCAR felt it was important to have some consistency within the Reform movement and saw the prayer book as the gateway to Jewish identity. They wanted a book that would encourage individualism, but define the community in which that individualism is possible. Rabbi Shapiro and the Ritual Committee are also thinking that someone coming from another Reform synagogue ought to be able to see the same prayer book used in his or her home congregation.
