Unveilings at the Cemetery: A Note from Rabbi Shapiro

Dear Sinai Congregants -

Several congregants have asked me or members of our Ritual Committee if Sinai has a "policy" about unveilings. Here is my heartfelt response -

We do not have anything as official or officious at Sinai as a policy on unveilings. Both Cantor Mekler and I have another approach.

We believe that unveilings are very important moments in the process of mourning. Although a marker or gravestone can be dedicated or "unveiled" as early as 30 days after a funeral, we recommend that families wait until approximately one year has passed. In that way, the unveiling becomes a kind of signpost indicating most beautifully that the family of mourners has managed to make it through a full cycle of the seasons. They themselves have survived without at all forgetting their loved one. The unveiling is the opportunity to return to the cemetery and recognize this significant passage of time.

As important as it is, however, the unveiling does not have a required liturgy. Poems or stories can be used. The ceremony can be mostly English or partially in Hebrew. All that is required at one point is the recitation of the Kaddish.

All this means that the unveiling ceremony does not require a Rabbi or Cantor. Because of that, we usually suggest that families consider doing the ceremony on their own at their own pace. I even have a packet of possible readings that I send out to families who want to consider doing their own unveiling.

At the same time, the Cantor and/or I are definitely available to officiate at unveilings. We will be there gladly to stand by any family that wishes us to join them. Call me if you have questions. I would be honored to assist you in developing an unveiling ceremony that is appropriate for your family.

My Conversion

Several weeks ago Nicole Walters became Jewish. She prepared these remarks for the mikveh ceremony.

My faith in God started at a very young age. As I grew older I started to question some of the teachings that seemed so outdated. As I matured into a young woman, I disagreed more with the practices of my family. But never gave up believing in God, knowing there is something more powerful than myself.

I started looking for a place to nurture my beliefs, sadly I never felt quite right. Until 4 years ago when I met Craig. He told me he was Jewish, but he was new to the area and hadn't joined a synagogue. Several months later we took a trip to Toronto to visit his family. Shortly after arriving his Bubbe passed away. As Craig went to help his grandfather in his time of need, Craig's mother told me about the burial the next day. I had very little knowledge of how Jewish funerals worked. I was overwhelmed and had no idea of what to expect. Craig tried to prepare me for the service and explained that his family would sit shiva for seven days. I was moved by the experience although it was very sad. At the funeral everything was very simple there weren't any flowers and the casket was a simple wood casket. Later I asked about the flowers and his family said that instead they asked tzedakah to be given. At the cemetery after they lowered her into the ground his family took a shovel and placed earth on the casket, it was very moving that this was real they were finding closure in such an honest way. Later when we arrived at the shiva house all of the mirrors were covered with sheets. The simplicity was moving no vanity, nothing was being put on and no one was trying to be brave there was only remembrance and mourning. Craig's family accepted me with open arms and tried to explain the events to me.

It started to make sense. I wanted to be a part of the Jewish people. I wanted to learn more. What were the teachings of this 4,000 year old religion? I couldn't learn fast enough, I tried to learn about the culture, the food, traditions, and religion of the Jewish people. I read and really got excited; I had finally found what I needed for my spirituality to grow.

I soon found Sinai Temple and visited for Friday night services. As I sat absorbing everything that was happening, I felt I was home and at complete peace. I soon thereafter knew that conversion would truly make me happy. Now the hard part was asking a rabbi to perform the conversion. It took a while, but after a few phone calls.

Rabbi Shapiro met with us.

Now after learning about Judaism and spending time at the synagogue celebrating Shabbat and holidays, I am finally beginning to get it. On Shabbat as I rush to services I feel tired but when I arrive I exhale and I'm happy to be there. Shabbat for me is just being able to pray try to find peace after a long week to breath and relax. I attended High holiday services with Craig for the first time and each

I cried during that service, I think some of the tears were sad but most were tears of joy knowing I was in the right place. I was able to ask for atonement and hope to do better this next year.

There is also Pirkei Avot where Simon the Just teaches so beautifully: The world is sustained by three things, by the Torah, by worship, and by loving deeds. I hope that all of these Torah, worship and good deeds will help my life to be a better one. I know my decision to convert and become part of the Jewish people was the right path to find happiness. Although I have learned some I feel my journey is only beginning. I hope my learning will extend through my life to my future husband and children and bring peace to my family.

The Gurland Human Relations Award

The 2006 Human Relations Award Established in Honor of Rabbi Jerome S. Gurland has been awarded to the Massachusetts Career Development Institute, Inc., for their project “Seeds for Self-Sufficiency.”

“Seeds for Self-Sufficiency” is a community project established by MCDI in collaboration with Springfield College, for the purpose of cultivating a garden to benefit a significant cross-section of the Springfield Community. The garden will serve as a learning lab for low-income adults, including refugees from Somalia, Burma, and Russia, as well as pre-school children in the area. Instruction in how to start and maintain the garden is being provided by MCDI and Springfield College students. In addition to serving a source of healthy food, the garden’s presence will promote discussion of environmental issues and demonstrate what can be accomplished when Springfield College and the surrounding community share an interest and activity. Ground has been broken, seeds have been planted, and the garden is well on its way.

LVM is the premier volunteer literacy organization in the state, managing 1000 tutor/student pairs per year.

Sarah is finishing her junior year at Tufts and plans to go on to pursue graduate work in clinical psychology. She will be volunteering at the Germaine-Lawrence Residential Center for troubled girls in Arlington, Massachusetts. She will be living and working with adolescent girls who have suffered serious emotional or physical abuse. Her work will involve leading group discussions and planning events as well as helping to develop ties between Germaine-Lawrence and the Arlington community. Her ambition is to become a therapist specializing in the needs of adolescent girls.
