Take Back Your Time: Rediscover Shabbat

What if you don't pray much? What if Torah Study sounds intimidating? Is there anything else at Sinai Temple that might touch you or matter?

I think the month of May just might be what you are looking for. Two alternate paths into Sinai are coming your way.

First, there is Mitzvah Day on Sunday, May 3. Between the hours of 9 a.m. and noon that day we are inviting anyone and everyone at Sinai to volunteer. If you like to bike ride, grab your helmet and come join us for an 18 mile journey. Aside from the fun, we are asking riders to donate toward a fund that will provide summer camp scholarships to needy kids in Springfield. Too active? Come paint three classrooms at a Springfield pre-school. Or plant some bushes at the Temple. Or join the group taking army veterans out to brunch. Or join the group that will play instrumental music at the Jewish Nursing Home.

We've got a mini-bike ride for young families. We're making sandwiches for the homeless. You can even get your car washed by our 6th and 7th graders.

On Sunday, May 3, your Temple can matter to you and to the larger community if you become part of Mitzvah Day.

OR consider the possibility of signing up for the first-ever intergenerational softball game on Sunday, May 17. We have challenged Temple Beth El to a softball game for everyone at the JCC between 11 a.m. and 12:30 p.m.

Adult men and women will play an inning or two. Kids of all ages will play against each other in other innings. One "team" will lose, but none of us can lose on a morning that promises to be relaxed, joyful, and good for the Jews!

As the school year draws to a close I am thinking about our plans for the upcoming year. We have thought long and hard about how to make our education programs the most beneficial and accessible to our students while maintaining the integrity of the programs. We are very excited to announce that beginning with the 5770 school year Sundays will take on a new and we hope improved format. We will be maintaining all classes in a single session, but making that session slightly shorter and adjusting the content of the program slightly. The Sunday session will run from 9:00a.m. to 11:30a.m. and, will include Talmud Torah in its current format, adding forty minute periods for Hebrew study, taught by Hebrew teachers, and special topics and programming will be introduced and focused during the two and a half hour period. We hope these small changes will reap huge benefits for our students.

While we are planning for next year we still have some exciting and wonderful things going on for this year. We have exciting things planned for Mitzvah Day on May 3rd, the sixth graders have prepared a Drash, in the form of a one act play, for the Kabbalat Service on Friday, May 8th, and our fifth graders, who have been studying drama with Merle Zemansky Coen on Sundays, will be performing their short one act play, on the final Sunday of school, May 17th at 10:00 a.m. right before we take off for the fields at JCC to challenge teams from Temple Beth El. It will be a wonderful day full of fun and excitement.

So as things wind down, it is a very busy month ahead. I look forward to seeing you all during this wonderful and busy month.

Not much rhetoric on my part this month, just some VERY IMPORTANT dates to remember:


Sunday, May 3 - Mitzvah Day-SPFTY will join in the Tikkun Olam Fun.



The Scroll of Life is a work of art in the Oneg Shabbat Room. It was created by Presentations Gallery of New York. The Isaiah quote at the bottom of the Scroll was taken from the Yom Kippur Haftarah as an expression of hope.

The Scroll has space on it so that Sinai members can commemorate either joyous events or memorialize loved ones. Each contribution of a plaque on the Scroll will be used to enrich the life and strength of Sinai. The cost of each plaque is \$200. The inscription may be 3-4 lines with a maximum of 27 spaces per line.



Birkat Ha-chama - Blessing of the Sun April 8, 2009



On April 8, we celebrated together the Blessings of the Sun Service, marking, as tradition has it, the return of the sun to the position it was in when it was set by God in the Heavens for earth's benefit. Rabbi Waskow, in his book *Seasons of our Joy*, explained the origins of this tradition which calls for this celebration every 28 years.

Excerpted from *Seasons of our Joy* by Rabbi Arthur Waskow:

Today [April 8, 1981], as I complete this book, is perhaps the strangest of all the seasons of our joy for it will not come again for twenty eight years. It is the day of the Blessing of the Sun Birchat Ha Chamah.

On that day, according to the Talmud, the sun returns to where it was in the Heavens on the fourth day of Creation, That was when God set the sun and the moon to "serve as signs for the seasons." (Gen. 1:14). So today it is in a sense the season of the seasons, the cycle of the birth of all our cycles.
