Some things happen once in a generation. One such unique development is about to take place across the Reform movement. We are inaugurating a new prayer book.

The last time this took place was when I was a rabbinic student. In 1975, our movement unveiled what was for its time a very novel prayer book. It is the book we have used for many years at Sinai. We call it Gates of Prayer.

When it premiered, Gates of Prayer was one-of-a-kind. No other movement in Judaism had created a prayer book in decades. The new book rearranged the placement of Hebrew and English on the page. It introduced clear references to the Holocaust and Israel, which no other siddur yet contained. The book also brought new creative readings into the modern synagogue.

And then time passed. The gender revolution transformed our culture. Different notions about the role of ritual, music, and formality developed. Spirituality became a much more powerful force. Computers revolutionized how we look at the printed word.

All these cultural shifts led us at Sinai to develop the several prayer pamphlets we use on Friday evenings. Now they have led to the creation of a totally new prayer book for our entire movement.

The book will be called **Mishkan Tefilah – A Dwelling Place for Prayer**.

BUT here is the most critical point. Sinai is NOT adopting this prayer book right now. Instead of that, we are inviting EVERYONE in the congregation to try out the new book at services and in study opportunities. **We want your input before a decision on the book is made.**

We'll use the book for services on Fridays, November 9 and 16. We'll study the book on some Saturdays in December in place of regular Torah Study from 9 to 10 a.m.

Some things happen once in a generation. Adopting a new prayer book is one such singular event. Come visit over the next few weeks. **You can be part of this once-in-a-generation decision for Sinai.**



“FRIDAY NIGHT LIVE” is the name coined by Jewish singer/composer Craig Taubman, who created an idea to liven up the worship experience at Sinai Temple of Westwood, California. It became an instant success! Word spread and several Reform congregations across the country began to use his music.

OUR own Sinai Temple, of the same name, was one of the very first congregations to give it a try. We, at Sinai, introduced our OWN version and shared it when we hosted a regional Biennial convention here in Springfield many years ago. Our sanctuary and auditorium were filled with an electric community spirit of joyous singing, clapping and dancing as we all joined together in an uplifting, exhilarating, participatory prayerful Shabbat service. Though the congregation that evening hadn’t been together in prayer before everyone was able to sing and participate with contagious fervor.

That service and OUR monthly Friday Night Live services at Sinai Temple were modeled from the CONCEPT of the original Friday Night Live service and also from a service the rabbi and I experienced at Congregation B’nai Jeshurun, which is a Conservative congregation on the upper West side of New York. For many years as part of our annual Confirmation Class Retreat in NYC we brought the class to “BJ” to share in their Kabbalat Shabbat worship service. Our kids loved the music, instrumental accompaniment and spirituality of the experience.

Drink Responsibly

I love my coffee in the morning. I set the timer for 6 AM on the pot the before I go to bed. I rise with or before the sun, pad downstairs to the coffee pot, and just press a little lever to add a nice steaming cup of coffee to some milk. Wrapping two hands on a mug, I inhale the aroma, I take a small sip. I get a little caffeine jolt and my morning begins.

Does this sound like your routine? Or do you enjoy decaffeinated coffee as part of your day?

Sinai Temple is helping me to drink responsibly through a collaboration with Equal Exchange, a Fair trade coffee organization. What is Fair Trade coffee and why do I care? We are used to bad news about the global economy. Over the past few years, for example, farming communities across Latin America, Africa and Asia have faced a crisis as world coffee prices have collapsed to their lowest point in decades.

But today, we are sharing some good news. Through Equal Exchange's Interfaith Program and partnerships with faith based relief, development and human rights organizations, many congregations like our own are making a difference in the lives of small farmers and their families. By purchasing fairly traded coffee through the program, they are ensuring that farmers receive a fair price, have access to affordable credit and are able to support their families and invest in their communities.

What difference can a simple cup of coffee make? Jose Luis Castillo Vasquez, a member of a cooperative in El Salvador put it simply: "I want to thank all of the congregations that purchase our coffee," he said. "It is thanks to you that we have a seed of hope in our lives."



Scroll of Life



The Scroll of Life is a work of art in the Oneg Shabbat Room. It was created by Presentations Gallery of New York. The Isaiah quote at the bottom of the Scroll was taken from the Yom Kippur Haftarah as an expression of hope.

The Scroll has space on it so that Sinai members can commemorate either joyous events or memorialize loved ones. Each contribution of a plaque on the Scroll will be used to enrich the life and strength of Sinai.
