Mah nisbtana - What makes this year different? It seems obvious. Everything is different. In many ways it feels as if the ground has shifted under our feet. A cloud of uncertainty about the future and our financial security hangs over us all.

Towards the middle of March, I was thinking these somber thoughts when the words of the Four Questions came to mind.

Mah nisbtana - What makes this night different? I've said those words hundreds of times since I was a child. They just never hit me as strongly as they do this year because this year it does feel as if so many aspects of life are in flux. We are all worried that this year is much, much too different from other years.

Or is it?

Maybe, when we step back and think about it, we can see that this year and this Passover in particular are really not that different. Smaller retirement portfolios, yes. Concern about budgets, yes.

But, when it comes to Passover, the blessing is that the holiday hasn't changed! Your Haggadah should have the same wine stains as last year. Matzah will crackle and crumble when you bite it this year. Your friends and family will probably love (and even aggravate) you much as they did last year. Children will be older. You will look older too.

But the great truth is that, in spite of everything outside that chips away at our confidence, our most precious assets on the inside are intact. We've got friends and family grown over many years. We've got people with whom we can celebrate, laugh, cry, complain, and sing no matter what concerns the outside world presents.

Mah nisbtana - What makes this year different?

A lot makes this year different, but even more remains the same. What remains the same is what really matters: traditions, poetry, song, hope, faith, and people. Have a very good Passover. You deserve it.

If you are among those congregants who pay full dues in your category, your telephone may ring this month. Members of the Sustaining Membership Committee will be calling you to ask that you become a Sustaining Member of Sinai.

What is a Sustaining Member?

A Sustaining Member is someone who chooses to offer Sinai an extra amount of fund beyond dues. During the current fiscal year, over 90 Sinai households became Sustaining Members and contributed over \$50,000 to our budget.

By doing this, the Sustaining Members helped reduce the need to raise the fees for Temple members who cannot afford full dues. By assuming a kind of “fair share,” the Sustaining Members also allowed Sinai to continue to offer a full and varied menu of programs.

Dear Friends:

When Yom HaShoah (Holocaust Memorial Day) starts on the 27th of Nisan, the evening of Monday April 20, 2009, there is something simple and beautiful which you can do to commemorate the Holocaust. You can purchase and light a Yahrzeit/Memorial Candle in your home.

At that time, you might want to have a moment of silence, use the prayer that follows, or create something of your own. My family and I have used a yahrzeit candle for this purpose and found it to be a very moving experience. I hope you will allow the yahrzeit candle to become a new tradition for your household as well.

A limited number of candles will be available at the Temple office if you wish to pick one up there. You can also purchase a candle at a grocery store.

*A Prayer for Lighting the “Holocaust Candle”
I/we light this memorial candle in order not to forget the lives of the Jewish men, women, and children who are symbolized by its flame. They were brutalized for no reason; their lives were taken in cruelty. May we be inspired to learn about our six million brothers and sisters as individuals and as communities; and may we recall not only the terror of their deaths, but the splendor of so many of their lives. May the memory of their lives inspire us to hallow our own lives, and to live meaningful Jewish lives so that we may help to ensure that part of who they were always endures.*

Message from Sheila Shear Director of Education

Shalom Chaverim

Why is what students do here at Sinai beyond Bar and Bat Mitzvah important? Please read below the position paper recently delivered by three of our Sinai 9th graders who attended a L'Taken seminar at the Religious Action Center in Washington, D.C. Students delivered this paper at the offices of Congressman Richard Neal. It is just one of the ways post B'nai Mitzvah Jewish education is important to how we look at and respond to the world around us. I think looking at our world through a Jewish lens truly encourages the development of a student's healthy social conscience. Thanks to Hallie Goldstein, Mara Rockowitz and Sarah Breslau for representing us well and to Matt Bertuzzi for chaperoning this important trip.

Position Paper Delivered at the offices of Congressman Richard Neal March 2, 2009

Hallie Goldstein: Introduction

This nation needs gun control because nearly 30,000 Americans die each year from gun violence. According to the Coalition to Stop Gun Violence, over \$20 Million has been given by the "gun rights" lobby to congress since 1990. This has led to weak federal gun control legislation that could have saved thousands of lives each year. According to the Brady Center, the 1994 Assault Weapons Act, that banned 19 different assault weapons, led to a 66% decrease in the use of those banned guns in violent crimes. This was great until September of 2004 when the AWA expired. Also, the Gun Show Loophole Closing Act would prevent criminals from obtaining firearms without background checks. Each day, eight Americans under the age of 19 die from gun violence.

Mara Rockowitz: A Personal Account

Mario Hornsby Jr. was 17 years old, a Springfield Central High School student, and my close friend. His death was a result of gang violence by teenagers. The shooters opened fire on the group of teens, including Mario. By supporting the Assault Weapons Ban and the Law Enforcement Protection Act, Congressman Neal would be renewing and strengthening the original 1994 ban and preventing dangerous high fire-power assault weapons from being available for criminal use. Also, supporting the Gun Show Loophole Closing Act when it is reintroduced would ensure the safety of law abiding citizens by preventing criminals and minors from obtaining firearms without a background check. With his support, we can keep future deaths like Mario's from

happening again.

As Jews, our tradition emphasizes the sanctity and value of human life. The carelessness with which human life is taken by guns stands in direct violation of those affirmations of our tradition. Rabbi Eric Yoffie, the President of the Union for Reform Judaism states, "First and foremost we need to see the control of guns not as a political problem but as a solemn religious obligation. Our gun-flooded society has turned weapons into idols, and the worship of Idols must be recognized for what it is - blasphemy. The only appropriate religious response to idolatry is sustained moral outrage." The URJ has long recognized the need for legislation "that would limit and control the sale and use of firearms." Over the years, the Union has spoken on gun control issues with particular passion, insisting that gun regulation and control is a "vital necessity."

Sarah Breslau: Conclusion

We would appreciate if Congressman Neal would co-sponsor the upcoming gun control legislation in the 111th Congress. We would like him to support the Assault Weapons Ban, the Law Enforcement Protection Act, and close the Gun Show Loophole, so we don't have a repeat of the story of Mario Hornsby Jr. Thanks for giving up your time to meet with us and have a great rest of the day!



We need to replace many of our folding chairs. They are wobbling and telling us they need to go to chair "heaven." Cost - Approximately \$3,000

Our sound system (the microphones and speakers that let you hear the Rabbi and Cantor) often lets us down. We can "sound" better with your help. Cost - Approximately \$18,000
