Have we got a “theme” at Sinai this year?

Yes, we do. We are trying to do whatever we can to build connections and community among our members. I see us offering more opportunities than ever to be together and to feel that belonging to Sinai Temple makes a difference in our lives.

Consider the series we call “Big Questions: Jewish Answers.” (See page 5.) On the one hand, it is an educational offering for adults. On the other hand, it’s more than that because of its format and packaging. Instead of inviting a few students to sit at desks to learn about something Jewish, we have invited congregants to have dinner together, unwind at the end of a work day, and then enter a challenging Jewish conversation.

We want everyone to learn something, but we have also set up the evening to build connections and community.

The same holds true with the special Friday evenings we are planning for December 18, January 15, and February 12. (We already had one on November 20.) Our service takes place at 6 p.m., which is nice. But what follows is central to the larger purpose. We offer dinner plus a stimulating program. Dinner to bring people together. The program to liven up our hearts and souls.

Connection and community.

We’re done some special programming in the school to embrace the families of our younger students. More is in store for members of all ages.

It really isn’t the same congregation as last year. It’s your congregation trying to focus on you. It’s our religious community trying to open the doors so that belonging to Sinai makes you feel you are in the best place under the Western Massachusetts sun!

Message from President Mark Stone

It's November 25 and we have held up the development of our bulletin for a few extra days. The reason is that I have been working on an idea for outreach that had its start in comments I made Rosh Hashanah morning. One of our goals for this year is reaching out to those who are not affiliated with a congregation. Back on Rosh Hashanah, I asked each of you to think of unaffiliated people you might know. We will be contacting you to ask for suggestions in the next few months.

Meanwhile, what have I been up to? Just this morning at my request, the Presidents and Rabbis of Temple Beth El and the new Bnai Torah convened with me and Rabbi Shapiro to start dialog on how we as a community can reach out to those unaffiliated with a synagogue. It is my belief that together we can be stronger in this effort. Our meeting went very well many ideas were passed around the table and we agreed to meet again in mid December to further the process. In addition to the three synagogues, we agreed to reach out to The Jewish Federation of Western MA as well as The Harold Grinspoon Foundation with hopes of collaborating on this effort and they have enthusiastically agreed to meet at our next meeting. Together with the other congregations and our other partners we want to figure out how best to approach synagogue affiliation utilizing any resources we and our partners bring to the table.

So, Sinai will be embarking on a more active effort in outreach externally to our congregation and I will keep you posted on our efforts in this area. As a reminder, I am hoping you to will consider doing your part to ensure Sinai thrives for a long time to come. If you recall I have a few things I was asking each member to consider:

Be participants: Come to services and participate in programs.

Lead Sinai: If you have never been on a committee, please join one.

Be a lifelong member: Continue your Sinai experience even after life cycle events.

Be a recruiter!!

Thank you for considering what you can do for Sinai. My hope is that together you and I will ensure Sinai will thrive for future generations.

First, for Chanukah, we are blessed with not one but TWO Friday nights during Chanukah this year! Friday, December 11 will be the first night of Chanukah, and is our monthly "Service with a Band." Come and hear some beautiful Chanukah music with additional instrumental accompaniment. On December 18, the eighth night of Chanukah, we will have a cast of thousands (well, dozens) of different musical groups, including "Shir Fun!" and the Adult Volunteer Choir presenting a wide variety of Chanukah music, from new melodies to old favorites! There's lots more to Chanukah music than dreidels made out of clay; come and hear for yourself on either (or both) of these evenings!

Friday, January 29 will be Shabbat Shirah, so named because the Torah portion for that Shabbat features the crossing of the Sea of Reeds, and the dramatic song that our ancestors sung when we reached the other side in freedom. To celebrate this event, "Shir Fun!" and the Jewish Community Youth Chorale will perform together, first here at Sinai Temple at 6:00, and then again across the street at Temple Beth El at 7:30. Be sure to hear the wonderful sound of the combined groups making a joyful noise unto God on this special evening!

NEWS from Sinai's new Interfaith Outreach Committee

As you are all aware, Sinai is facing challenging economic times and we are in the process of renewing and strengthening the bonds of our congregational community. One key element is maintaining and increasing strong membership connections. To that end we have created an Interfaith Outreach Committee, an idea which came directly from the list of 10 Commandments of Transformation created by the board last summer. Our Temple mission statement speaks of Sinai as “a welcoming and inclusive Reform congregation,” and this committee is asking how we are accomplishing this vision when it comes to interfaith households who belong to Sinai Temple. We are examining how we welcome and support interfaith families at Sinai in order to discover what we have been doing “right” and where we can improve.



The interfaith committee has a 3-part plan. First, we will gather information from our interfaith families through a series of focus groups. Next, we plan to synthesize that information and generate suggested changes to help make all of our interfaith families feel that Sinai is their home. Finally, we are making small but important changes along the way, to ensure that our physical building and presence on the Web reflect the diversity we have here at Sinai.

You may have already noticed the following changes:

- The creation of a dedicated library shelf for books on interfaith topics.
- The addition of interfaith related links (under “adult ed”) on our temple website.
- The prominent display of brochures relating to interfaith and other topics of interest.

Also keep an eye out for these other changes coming soon:

- The addition of several new titles to our interfaith library shelf.
- The creation of a “Sinai 101” booklet to give members and guests the information they need to feel comfortable during services.
- A dedicated interfaith page on Sinai’s website
- Press releases/newspaper articles about our interfaith outreach project
- Invitations to our interfaith families to attend focus groups

Take Back Your Time: Rediscover Shabbat in December and January

Last year Sinai distributed a booklet with 52 ideas for “tasting” Shabbat. Here is an encore presentation of some of those ideas.

“I listen to Shabbat music while driving home from work on Erev Shabbat.”

“For me, the best way to experience Shabbat is outside where I can breathe, see, touch and smell the world as God created it. I try to go to a wooded place. The greatest gift I can give myself on Shabbat is to find an hour or so to be in nature.”

“When possible, we spend Shabbat out of doors: hiking, at the beach, biking, skating, gardening—some activity that puts us in touch with our bodies and nature.”

“I try to observe a “green” Shabbat, minimizing my detrimental impact on the earth. I do errands by bicycle rather than by car, eat vegetarian rather than meat meals and refrain from using appliances (washers, dishwashers, etc.)”

“Before Shabbat dinner I perform the hand washing ritual. As I pour the water over my hands I think about how I’ve used my hands over the past week and how I will use them in the upcoming week.”



Scroll of Life



The Scroll of Life is a work of art in the Oneg Shabbat Room. It was created by Presentations Gallery of New York. The Isaiah quote at the bottom of the Scroll was taken from the Yom Kippur Haftarah as an expression of hope.

The Scroll has space on it so that Sinai members can commemorate either joyous events or memorialize loved ones. Each contribution of a plaque on the Scroll will be used to enrich the life and strength of Sinai. The cost of each plaque is \$200. The inscription may be 3-4 lines with a maximum of 27 spaces per line.
