Dr. Freund is the author of hundreds of articles and eight books. From 1983-86 he directed the Seminario Rabinico Latinoamericano, the only rabbinical seminary of Latin America in Buenos Aires and was a member of the President of Argentina’s council on Human Rights.

Notes from Cantor Martin Levson

I have had the privilege of giving a presentation on the subject of “Jews and Superheroes” a couple of times during the past few months. While at first glance, the idea of spandex-clad, cape-wearing crime fighters may have little to do with Judaism, there are some interesting things to consider. An overwhelming number of the people who created the classic American superheroes were Jewish! Superman (Jerry Siegel and Joe Shuster), Captain America (Joe Simon and Jack “King” Kirby), The Fantastic Four, The Hulk, and The X-Men (Stan Lee and Jack Kirby) were all originally written and illustrated by Jews, the children of Eastern European immigrants! The character of Spiderman, created by Lee and Steve Ditko (who is not Jewish, but is of Eastern European immigrant descent) was very much the stereotype of the “Woody Allen” Jew of the 1960’s: Brilliant but socially inept high school kid living in Forest Hills, Queens with his overprotective aunt, who becomes a crime fighter out of guilt! While they weren’t intentionally trying to write “Jewish characters,” many of these classic American superheroes display a number of Jewish values and ideals in their never-ending battle for truth, justice, and the American way.

It is in this spirit that we will be celebrating a superhero-themed Purim this year. The shpiel will be a loving tribute to the classic superhero stories of the 1960s, as “Captain Mordechai” and “Bet-Woman” attempt to save the Jews of Shushanopolis from the dastardly designs of “Doctor Haman!” So channel your own inner superhero (or super-villain), wear a cape and a mask (spandex optional), dress up as a classic superhero or make up your own super-person, and join us on Wednesday, March 7 as we celebrate “Super Purim!” “Up, up, and Oy Vey!”

As the winter months wear on with hardly a nod to winter weather (can't say I'm complaining) we continue to learn with and from our students. We continue to help them recognize that Judaism, ritual and Torah apply to their lives. Being Jewish is not always easy, is not always convenient and it is not always popular. What it is, is engaging, enlightening, holy and full of delight. We try to help our students recognize that Torah and Judaism have important things to say to them about living in 2012 and beyond. The lessons of Torah are not just for their grandparents and their parents. The lessons of Torah move us forward. Through curricula such as Sacred Choices, Jewish Lens, SPARK and Rosh Hodesh, through trips to the Religious Action Center, to Alabama and New Orleans, our children learn to view themselves as vital, important and special. They learn to live Jewishly. It's not about inconvenience, or sacrifice, it is about living a life fulfilled, a life of giving and sharing. Religious study is not for 5 years between the ages of 8 and 13, it is for living daily and life long learning.

This summer Sinai Temple invites students to get involved with tikkun olam – repairing the world. We would like to underwrite students who choose to spend their summer in a project that enriches the world. Call the office if you haven't received one. Those who are selected will be paid a salary of approximately \$8.00 an hour. Why is the Temple offering this program? We began this program to honor the memory of Susan M. Broh, a Temple member who died in September 2001. Susan began her career of "tikkun olam" by dedicating two years of her life to the Peace Corps. After that, Susan devoted her professional and volunteer life to making this world a better place. She believed passionately in the Jewish obligation of pursuing justice. Susan's friends and family have created this program to honor her memory and to encourage other Jews to strive for holiness as Jews must always do.

SPFTY has been very busy this year. We have participated in every NFTY Northeast event so far, including NFTY Northeast's Summer Institute, the Leadership Training Institute, the Levi Leap dance, Fall Conclavette, and December Institute. We even sent a representative to the URJ Biennial Convention! For the first time ever, SPFTY members are also attending Winter Wonderland, a region wide ski weekend in New Hampshire. Our participation in NFTY-Northeast events has inspired us to create our own NFTY style service, held on Friday, February 3 for ourselves and our families. We even invited the 8th graders to attend!

With the many NFTY events we have attended we also managed to fit in several activities of our own here at Sinai Temple. We had a great time kidnapping the freshman at the annual "Freshman Kidnap." It was so great seeing them again! We also helped serve at the temple's annual Chanukah dinner in December and held a movie night in January.

Coming this spring, we are planning a TYGOR event March 30-31. A TYGOR event is a sub-regional activity that includes any TYG (Temple Youth Group) from Massachusetts and Connecticut about an hour away. Friday, March 30, SPFTY will lead a NFTY style service for the Sinai Temple Congregation and our guests from youth groups within our region. Later that night, we will present an interactive theatrical game based on the Clue board game and movie. We will dress up as the Clue characters and participants will attempt to solve our mystery! Some of NFTY Northeast's regional board members will also participate as characters in our game. After we solve the mystery, we are planning a shul-in for the participants with games and activities throughout the night. We are planning a social action component to this shul-in as well.

In March, SPFTY is planning a bake sale to benefit the American Jewish World Service. We will be attending NFTY's Northeast region wide Spring Conclavette and other TYGOR events hosted by synagogues in the area. Also in the spring, we are hoping to hold a car wash, plan an activity with Sinai Temple's 8th graders, and possibly participate in a program at a local nursing home or assisted living center.

Teen Engagement Task Force Summary Report

A special “Teen Engagement” task force was formed at Sinai Temple last year. The stated objective of the group was to investigate the status of teen engagement at Sinai. Using the URJ’s “Planning Guide for Teen Engagement” as its guide, the first step the group took was to prepare an inventory and description of the current activities available to our teens. The task force then held three focus groups with parents and teens, ably facilitated by Steve Sussman. Input was sought regarding the quality of the offerings and where there were areas for improvement. The deliverable of the group was to prepare a findings report to be passed on to the board with recommendations.

There were a few recurring themes that came out of the sessions:

Finding: Sinai offers a wide variety of programming for our teens via both our Religious school and youth groups. Some parents were unaware of all of the programs and how they align with what the URJ describes as the Four Pillars of Teen Engagement: 1) Experiential Education 2) Classroom Curriculum 3) Social and Emotional Development and 4) Congregational Support.

Recommendation: Communication and education about the programs should be reviewed and enhanced.

Finding: JOY youth group programming primarily focuses on social gatherings and for some, there is a perception that SPFTY is primarily just social as well.

Recommendation: Review youth group programming to ensure a variety of ‘well-rounded’ offerings are planned and communicated for all age groups. Improve communications to better articulate the social action, leadership development, worship and educational aspects of the programming.

Finding: Kids are more likely to participate in events if they have friends who also attend them. It’s harder to form social relationships in later grades and sometimes the only time some of our kids see each other is during RS classes. If we want our teens to participate, we need to help them build the bonds of friendship early.

Recommendation:

The RS Committee and Youth Committee will continue to work collaboratively, (as they did on this task force), to insure programming is designed to support all four of the URJ’s pillars of engagement.

Examples:

SPARK/Heart/Action is a wonderful program that has run for several years now for our 8th graders. The students meet with senior citizens from our congregation and talk about how their lives are similar and different. We found that it’s a very popular program with both the kids and parents and it supports pillar 1 (Experiential Education) and pillar 3 (Social and Emotional Development).

Assess Sinai’s Youth Committee with an eye towards expanding its vision, mission, goals and objectives to include younger age groups to insure a continuity of social programming.

Example:

“STUFF” (Sinai Temple Under Five Families) is a great new program run by parents of young children. They bring the families together for fun activities and the programs are well attended. These types of events support both pillar 3 (Social and Emotional Development) and pillar 4 (Congregational Support). As a congregation, we need to build on that type of enthusiasm and engagement to temple life for our youth through high school.

There is a lot of additional rich information to cull through, assess and learn from. At this point, the data and findings will be turned over to the Youth Committee for continued review and action.

The task force would like to thank everyone who helped with this initiative, namely the Rabbi for having the foresight to form the committee, the Cantor for championing our Youth Committee, Sheila Shear for sharing her insight and knowledge, the representatives from both the Religious School and Youth Committees, all the volunteers who helped at the focus groups and additional feedback sessions, and the parents and teens who took time out their schedules to share their thoughts, comments and concerns. Your enthusiasm, encouragement and support of Sinai’s efforts to improve our teen engagement is not only appreciated, but necessary if we are to be successful at our goal of having our teens enjoy a rich and fulfilling Jewish life.

Richard Michelson is the Curator of Exhibitions at The National Yiddish Book Center and owns R. Michelson Galleries in Northampton, Massachusetts.

He is also a prize-winning poet and children’s book author.

In January 2009, “As Good As Anybody: Martin Luther King and Abraham Joshua Heschel’s Amazing March Toward Freedom,” was awarded the prestigious Sydney Taylor Award Gold Medal from the Association of Jewish Libraries, and “A is for Abraham,” was awarded the Silver Medal. This is the first time in the award’s 41-year history that one author has been honored with their top two awards. The Sydney Taylor Award is the most coveted award for writers of Jewish children’s literature.

In December 2010, Busing Brewster was selected by the NY Times as one of the 10 Best Illustrated Books of 2010, and one of 8 Notable Books of 2010; the only book to make both of their year-end lists.




**The Fourth Annual Bike Ride
