Take Back Your Time: Rediscover Shabbat

Another book!?! I do not have time to read another book. I don't have time to organize another project or teach/preach/write something else.

But nobody else has time either.

So here's the deal. In the midst of another year when we need to recruit and retain members for Sinai, let's study something at Sinai that you won't read anywhere else in the world

It's a new book called Jewish Theology in Our Time.

I know that large numbers of Sinai members wonder about God. Some are convinced God is a fiction. Some are fervent believers. Many are in between: sort of believing, sort of embarrassed to say they are not sure what to believe.

That is why this new book is important. It contains 25 short essays by fabulous, thoughtful Jewish thinkers. (A sampling of essay titles: Cosmic Theology and Earthly Religion; Open-Source Covenant; More Theos, Less Ology; How I Came to Theology, or Didn't)

I have no time for this book, but the possibilities for out-of-the-box thinking and conversation are irresistible. Therefore, I am going to make time to read the book with you...seekers, believers, questioning, learning Sinai Temple congregants.

I'm going to make time at two different times.

Three Thursday mornings for one hour - October 21, 28, and November 4 - from 7:30 to 8:30 a.m. (Bring along your own bagel. We'll meet in the Library.)

The same three Thursdays at lunch time - October 21, 28 and November 4 from noon to 1 p.m. (Bring a sandwich. We'll meet in the library.)

The book can be purchased for \$16 from Amazon, but, if you pre-register at the office by October 15, you'll get a free copy of the book. Free.

If you have no time, this is a good news bargain. It will take you almost no time to read the book as I'll divide it up. Looking forward to reading and talking with you soon!

Message from President Mark Stone

Can you believe Yom Kippur is over already? It is hard to believe the holidays came so early this year. Since we just talked together last week I promise to be brief. Our primary focus for this year will be on retention and recruitment as outlined in my comments Rosh Hashanah morning. These comments are available on our web site for your review. We will of course, focus on our other priorities I spoke of as well. Below please find an outline of our Ten Commandment for 2010-2011, which is a list of ALL of our initiatives. (A more detailed presentation of the Ten Commandments can also be found on the website.) Please consider being part of one of them either by participating or perhaps volunteering once or twice during the year.

I wish all of you and your families a sweet new year.

Ten Commandments of Transformation

In order to focus our activities during the coming year, the Board of Trustees voted to pursue ten initiatives. We hope these initiatives will enrich and strengthen Sinai.

1. Increase volunteerism through committees
 - Create a Committee on Committees that will recruit members to our standing committees.
 - Create a data base to track members' interests when possible. Use this data base to track all contacts with congregants requesting any volunteer activity.
2. Increase volunteerism on an "individual" basis
 - Create a "One-Time Committee" that will recruit Temple members for one-time volunteer opportunities. (Perhaps 4 to 5 initiatives to take place this year.)
 - Use data base referred to above.
3. Develop an active membership recruitment committee.
4. Focus on membership integration and retention committee.
5. Explore the development of a chavurah program.
 - *Chavurah (from the Hebrew chaver/friend) refers to a small group formed by Temple members who join together to share Jewish experiences, celebrate holidays, study, or perhaps just socialize. A chavurah (plural - chavurot) is a small community.*
6. Develop an outreach program for young families - children from birth to 3 & 4 years old.
7. Explore the development of an outreach program for young adults - ages 22-35
8. Continue to build community among our youth: focus on JOY & SPFTY
9. Increase attendance at Friday evening services
 - Develop ten Friday eve services with attendance greater than 150
 - Special focus on "services with a story" where student attendance is so important
10. Expand our I.T. with a focus on our e-mail connections, our website, Facebook, Twitter, You Tube and any other electronic means of communication.

Developed by the URJ Commission on Synagogue Music and the American Conference of Cantors, *Divrei Shir* is a nine-part curriculum that is designed to provide participants with a wide variety of learning experiences that will deepen their relationship with the sacred music of our people.

Through the study of Jewish music we will:

- gain insight into liturgy by exploring the relationship between text, music, and prayer.
- develop understanding and appreciation for the way music is integrated with the rhythms and seasons of Jewish life.
- gain deeper respect and appreciation for the wide range of Jewish musical traditions and styles.
- explore the many pathways of encountering the Divine through music in a community of prayer.

The first session of *Divrei Shir* will be held on Wednesday, October 27, at 7:30 P.M. Future sessions will be held in the following weeks. Please call the Temple office to register for this class, so that I can prepare enough materials for everyone, and please join me for *Divrei Shir*!

Finally, for those of you who would like to take a little road trip to the Berkshires on Sunday, October 10, I will be participating in a Cantoral Concert to raise money for URJ Camp scholarships.
